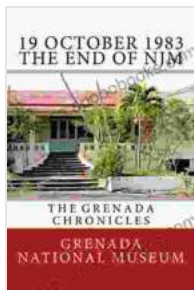


October 19, 1983: The End of N.J.M.: The Grenada Chronicles

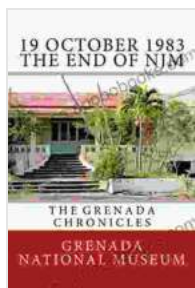
